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




WHAT

Shavuot – a Jewish holiday that occurs on the sixth day of the Hebrew month of Sivan (late May or early June).



Shavuot commemorates the anniversary of the day God gave the Torah to Moses and the Israelites at Mount Sinai.




It is one of the the three Biblical pilgrimage festivals. It marks the conclusion of the Counting of the Omer (a verbal counting of each of the forty-nine days between the Passover and Shavuot).

The Torah mandates the seven-week Counting of the Omer, beginning on the second day of Passover and immediately followed by Shavuot.

On Passover, the Jewish people were freed from their enslavement to Pharaoh; on Shavuot they were given the Torah and became a nation committed to serving God.

In the Bible, Shavuot is called the Festival of Weeks. The Mishnah and Talmud refer to Shavuot as Atzeret (Hebrew: a solemn assembly), as it provides closure for the festival activities during and following the Passover.

Since Shavuot occurs 50 days after Passover, Greeks gave it the name Pentecost (πεντηκόστη, "fiftieth day").



what's the significance of Sinai?

wilderness

no governor

Sinai is free from any political or national boundary. God meets this people in a place that no one owns because no one owns this God.

not ruled by political leader

not a country



This kingdom of God will be composed of a priestly people. All the Israelites would be living wholly in God's service and enjoying the right of access to him. And, as priests, they would have the duty of representing God to the nations . . . proclaiming God's word, interceding for people, and making provision for people to find God .
