




Then Jesus entered a house, and again a crowd gathered, so that he and his disciples were not even able to eat.

Mark 3:20



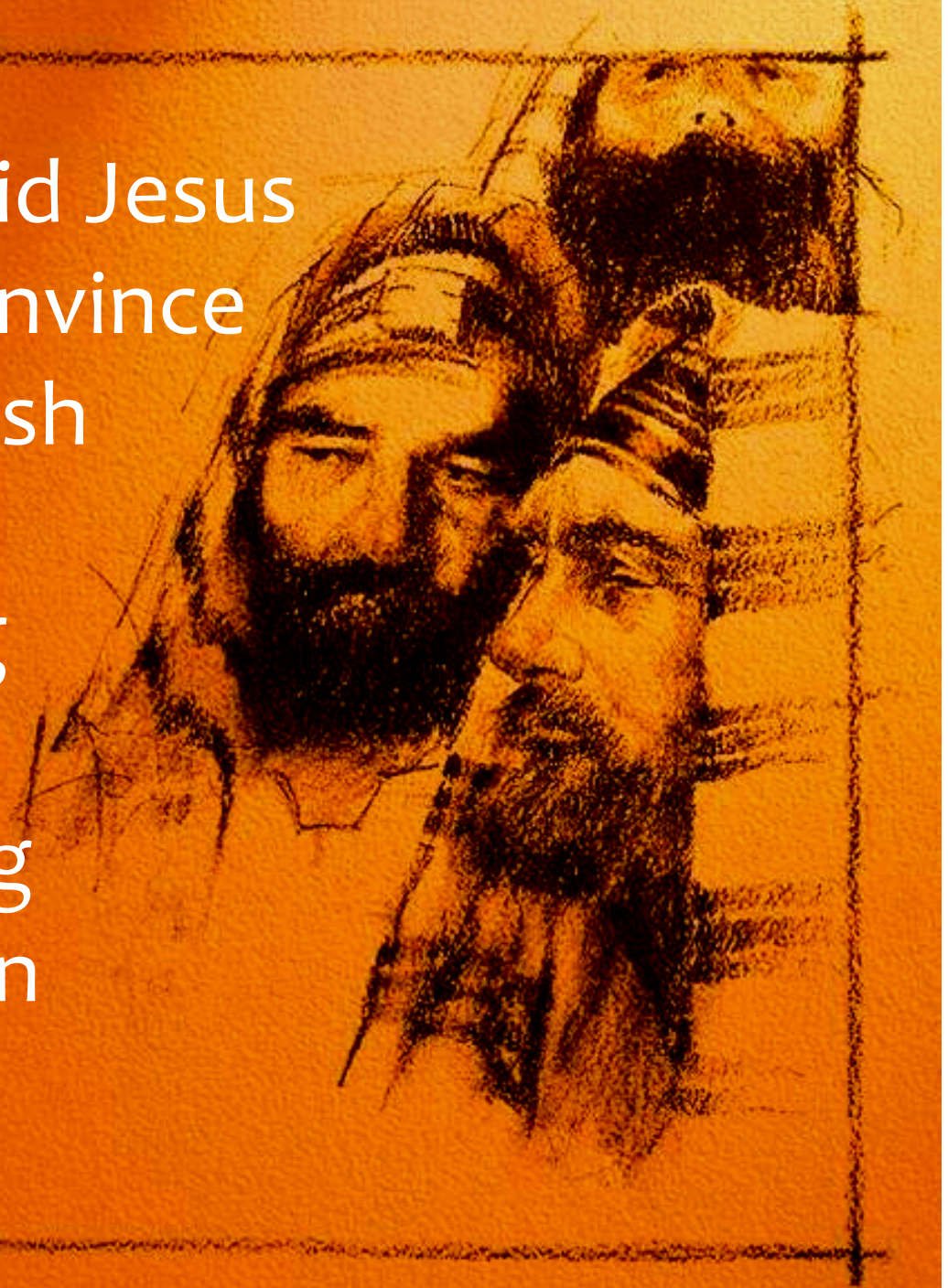
When his family heard about this, they went to take charge of him, for they said, "He is out of his mind."

What sort of life did Jesus live, in order to convince thousands of Jewish people to actually believe something that was actually against every thing they had ever been taught?




The Gospels were written too close to the life of Jesus to have been legends.
