Peace on Earth, Good Will to Men

Luke 2:14

Luke $2:1 - 14 - {}^{1}$ At that time the Roman emperor, Augustus, decreed that a census should be taken throughout the Roman Empire. 2 (This was the first census taken when Quirinius was governor of Syria.) 3 All returned to their own ancestral towns to register for this census. 4 And because Joseph was a descendant of King David, he had to go to Bethlehem in Judea, David's ancient home. He traveled there from the village of Nazareth in Galilee. 5 He took with him Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child.

⁶ And while they were there, the time came for her baby to be born. ⁷ She gave birth to her first child, a son. She wrapped him snugly in strips of cloth and laid him in a manger, because there was no lodging available for them.

⁸ That night there were shepherds staying in the fields nearby, guarding their flocks of sheep. ⁹ Suddenly, an angel of the Lord appeared among them, and the radiance of the Lord's glory surrounded them. They were terrified, ¹⁰ but the angel reassured them. "Don't be afraid!" he said. "I bring you good news that will bring great joy to all people. ¹¹ The Savior—yes, the Messiah, the Lord—has been born today in Bethlehem, the city of David! ¹² And you will recognize him by this sign: You will find a baby wrapped snugly in strips of cloth, lying in a manger."

¹³ Suddenly, the angel was joined by a vast host of others—the armies of heaven—praising God and saying, ¹⁴ "Glory to God in highest heaven, and **peace on earth** to those with whom God is pleased." (NLT)

John 3:16 & $17 - {}^{16}$ God loved the world so much that he gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life. 17 God sent his Son into the world **not to judge** the world, **but to save** the world through him. (NLT)

Hebrews 2:17 – For this reason he had to be made like his brothers in every way, in order that he might become a merciful and faithful high priest in service to God, and that he might turn aside God's wrath, taking away the sins of the people.

- April 12, 1861 Civil War begins and officially ends on April 9, 1865 with Lee's surrender to Grant at Appomattox Court House. However, the last shot is not fired until June 22, 1865.
- July 10, 1861 Fanny Longfellow is fatally burned in an accident in their home.
- Christmas 1861 "How inexpressibly sad are all holidays."
- July 1862 "I can make no record of these days. Better leave them wrapped in silence. Perhaps someday God will give me peace."
- December 25, 1862 "'A merry Christmas' say the children, but that is no more for me."
- 1863 Lt. Charles Longfellow is critically wounded and suffers permanent damage to his spine.
- Christmas Day, 1864 Longfellow writes Christmas Bells
- Four months later the Civil War ends

Revelation $21:1-5-^{1}$ Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and there was no longer any sea.² I saw the Holy City, the New Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride beautifully dressed for her husband.³ And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Now the dwelling of God is with men, and he will live with them.
