





So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. (NLT)






Figure 1.1. Typical village home in Palestine viewed from the side




Figure 1.2. Typical village home in Palestine viewed from above





Follow him to the house that he enters, ¹¹ and say to the owner of the house,




