How Tamar and Judah point to Jesus:

What'll make us able to work for justice and will make us able to admit the depth of our sin?

Notice what Judah was doing to Tamar.

He was about to punish her for *his* sins, but the one who came from Judah, the real Jesus, took the punishment for *our* sins.

Levirate marriage law (approx. 1750 B.C.) stated: If a man's son died that his next son in line would take his brother's wife in marriage.

Judah had no intent to honor that law any longer.

About three months later Judah was told, "Your daughter-in-law Tamar is guilty of prostitution, and as a result she is now pregnant." Judah said, "Bring her out and have her burned to death!" vs. 24

Why would Judah do such a thing? The answer is in verse 11-

"Live as a widow in your father's house until my son Shelah grows up." For he thought, "He may die too, just like his brothers." vs. 11

He needed to justify in his own mind what happened to his sons. He has been thinking about her yet not knowing how to blame her.

Now he has a reason in his mind.

Judah's moment of truth

"See if you recognize whose seal and cord and staff these are." ²⁶ Judah recognized them and said, "She is more righteous than I, since I wouldn't give her to my son Shelah." vs. 25,26

See, the first point of Tamar's breakthrough is a great point if you're into social justice.

But here's the second point ... you must be born again and that even a very good person, a very moral person, a very socially conscience person has to have a spiritual awakening.

What is a spiritual awakening? It's when you begin to see that you're no better than the people you used to despise. You are as wretched and lost as they are before a Holy God. That is a spiritual awakening.

Judah's redemption- on display in Genesis Chapter 44, years after the Tamar incident.

"Now then, please let your servant remain here as my lord's slave in place of the boy, and let the boy return with his brothers. 34 How can I go back to my father if the boy is not with me? No! Do not let me see the misery that would come on my father." Genesis 44:33
