Having determined our destiny ahead of time, he called us to himself and transferred his perfect righteousness to everyone he called. And those who possess his perfect righteousness he co-glorified with his Son!

What Does It Mean to Rejoice in Suffering? Habakkuk 3:1-19

Chapter 1- When Habakkuk looks around him, it seems the good suffer and the wicked prosper. Israel is corrupt, and if that wasn't bad enough God tells Habakkuk He's sending in an even greater evil; the Babylonians, to deal with Israel.

Chapter 2- But when he asks God why the good suffer, God explains that in the long run, they don't. God is in control of all creation, and only He can see how current circumstances fit into His greater plan.

Chapter 3- With that knowledge, Habakkuk now responds to God in thanks for being in control and eventually vindicating all of His faithful followers.

This prayer was sung by the prophet Habakkuk: ²I have heard all about you, Lord. I am filled with awe by your amazing works. In this time of our deep need, help us again as you did in years gone by. And in your anger, remember your mercy. vs.1,2

Verses 3-15 Habakkuk recalls God's great deeds in Israel's history.

I trembled inside when I heard this; (Habakkuk knew this day of trouble; the coming Babylonian invasion, was coming for His people) my lips quivered with fear. My legs gave way beneath me, and I shook in terror. I will wait quietly for the coming day when disaster will strike the people who invade us.¹⁷ Even though the fig trees have no blossoms, and there are no grapes on the vines; even though the olive crop fails, and the fields lie empty and barren; even though the flocks die in the fields, and the cattle barns are empty, ¹⁸ yet I will rejoice in the Lord! I will be joyful in the God of my salvation! ¹⁹ The Sovereign Lord is my strength! He makes me as surefooted as a deer, able to tread upon the heights.

vs. 16-19

When do you say God is good? When things are going well for you, right? It's the natural way to see God working in our lives.

When your fig trees are blossoming. When the money is there. When health is there. When things are going the way you want.

Everything in Habakkuk's life had gone wrong, yet he was overwhelmed with the goodness of God and as a result, he remained poised, despite impending suffering.

1. What is rejoicing in suffering?

Therefore, since we have been made right in God's sight by faith, we have peace with God because of what Jesus Christ our Lord has done for us. ² Because of our faith, Christ has brought us into this place of undeserved privilege where we now stand, and we confidently and joyfully look forward to sharing God's glory.

Romans 5:1,2

We can rejoice, too, when <u>we run into problems and trials</u>, for we know that they <u>help us develop endurance</u>. ⁴ And <u>endurance develops strength of character</u>, and <u>character strengthens our confident hope of salvation</u>. ⁵ And this hope will not lead to disappointment.

2. When does rejoicing in suffering happen?

16 (Yet)I trembled inside when I heard this; my lips quivered with fear. My legs gave way beneath me, and I shook in terror. Habakkuk 3:16a

Habakkuk was perplexed by his problems. He wasn't at all perplexed in his relation to God.

I will wait quietly for the coming day when disaster will strike the people who invade us.

Habakkuk 3:16b

A lot of people feel like, "If I'm crying uncontrollably and I'm filled with knee buckling grief, that somehow it's a lack of faith."

That's not what you see in the Bible.

3. Here's why it's possible to rejoice in suffering.

We are confident that God is able to orchestrate everything to work toward something good *and beautiful* when we love Him and accept His invitation to live according to His plan.

Romans 8:28 (Voice)

For God knew his people in advance, and he chose them to become like his Son, so that his Son would be the firstborn among many brothers and sisters.

Romans 8:29 NIT
