





when God comes



After the Philistines captured the Ark of God, they took it from the battleground at Ebenezer to the town of Ashdod. ² They carried the Ark of God into the temple of Dagon and placed it beside an idol of Dagon. ³ But when the citizens of Ashdod went to see it the next morning, Dagon had fallen with his face to the ground in front of the Ark of the Lord! So they took Dagon and put him in his place again. But the next morning the same thing happened—Dagon had fallen face down before the Ark of the Lord again. This time his head and hands had broken off and were lying in the doorway. Only the trunk of his body was left intact. 1 Samuel 5:1–4









Who was Dagon?

Dagon was the chief deity of the <u>Philistines</u>, and the worship of this pagan god dates back the third millennium BC. According to ancient mythology, Dagon was the father of Baal. He was the fish god (dag in Hebrew means "fish"), and he was represented as a half-man, half-fish creature.



Dagon had fallen with his face to the ground in front of the Ark of the Lord! So they took Dagon and put him in his place again.

1 Samuel 5:3





Then the Lord's heavy hand struck the people of Ashdod and the nearby villages with a plague of tumors. When the people realized what was happening, they cried out, "We can't keep the Ark of the God of Israel here any longer! He is against us! We will all be destroyed along with Dagon, our god." So they called together the rulers of the Philistine towns and asked, "What should we do with the Ark of the God of Israel?" 1 Samuel 5:6-8



The rulers discussed it and replied, "Move it to the town of Gath." So they moved the Ark of the God of Israel to Gath. But when the Ark arrived at Gath, the Lord's heavy hand fell on its men, young and old; he struck them with a plague of tumors, and there was a great panic. 1 Samuel 5:8,9



So they sent the Ark of God to the town of Ekron, but when the people of Ekron saw it coming they cried out, "They are bringing the Ark of the God of Israel here to kill us, too!"

The people summoned the Philistine rulers again and begged them, "Please send the Ark of the God of Israel back to its own country, or it will kill us all." For the deadly plague from God had already begun, and great fear was sweeping across the town. 1 Samuel 5:11



What Does This Story Tell Us When God Comes Close?

That God isn't permanently attached to any one thing. He isn't your genie in the bottle.

There are certain things that always are true when a person comes into God's presence, and they're all here in this story.

I. God's presence is always attached to total commitment.

Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A person reaps what they sow.

Galatians 6:7

II. God's presence is always connected to the destruction of Idols.

III. God's presence is always connected to His mercy.

Priests regularly entered the first room as they performed their religious duties. But only the high priest ever entered the Most Holy Place, and only once a year. And he always offered blood for his own sins and for the sins the people.
