


The account of the growth of the Church

And instantly it left her. Her masters' hopes of wealth were now shattered, so they grabbed Paul and Silas and dragged them before the authorities at the marketplace. Acts 16:18,19

They brought them before the magistrates and said, "These men are Jews, and are throwing our city into an uproar by advocating customs unlawful for us Romans to accept or practice." The crowd joined in the attack against Paul and Silas, and the magistrates ordered them to be stripped and beaten with rods. Acts 16:20-23



After they had been severely flogged, they were thrown into prison, and the jailer was commanded to guard them carefully.

2. In the face of harsh treatment Paul and Silas were kind and forgiving.




"The jailer called for lights, rushed in and fell trembling before Paul and Silas." Acts 16:29







2. Real faith makes you committed to community.

Immediately he and all his household were baptized.



3. Real faith fills you with joy.

He was filled with joy because he had come to believe in God—he and his whole household.



When it was daylight, the magistrates sent their officers to the jailer with the order: "Release those men."36 The jailer told Paul, "The magistrates have ordered that you and Silas be released. Now you can leave. Go in peace." 37 But Paul said to the officers: "They beat us publicly without a trial, even though we are Roman citizens, and threw us into prison. And now do they want to get rid of us quietly? No! Let them come themselves and escort us out." Acts 16:35-37



1. Paul is making them face their wrongdoing.



2. Paul gives the church political clout to fend off future abuse.



The officers reported this to the magistrates, and when they heard that Paul and Silas were Roman citizens, they were alarmed. ³⁹ They came to appease them and escorted them from the prison, requesting them to leave the city.

After Paul and Silas came out of the prison, they went to Lydia's house, where they met with the brothers and sisters and encouraged them.

Then they left. Acts 16:40

1. Don't be surprised by opposition when serving God.


Two Takeaways

2. Choosing to praise God during hard times reaps a harvest of Joy.


