

It was said that there were more statues of the gods in Athens than in all the rest of Greece put together, and that in Athens it was easier to meet a god than another person.










Epicurus-Epicureanism

in the body and trouble the soul."




Epictetus-Stoics

The highest goal in life is personal character improvements. The only thing you can control is your own moral choices. Everything else is outside your power.



Epictetus-Stoics

Stoics also believed in "Divine Reason" because human logic proved the existence of an overarching logic that governed the universe. They called this LOGOS.




Epictetus-Stoics

Then they took him and brought him to a meeting of the Areopagus, where they said to him, "May we know what this new teaching is that you are presenting? You are bringing some strange ideas to our ears, and we would like to know what they mean." (All the Athenians and the foreigners who lived there spent their time doing nothing but talking about and listening to the latest ideas.) Acts 17:19-21

²³ For as I walked around and looked carefully at your objects of worship, I even found an altar with this inscription: to an unknown god. So you are ignorant of the very thing you worship—and this is what I am going to proclaim to you." Acts 17:23



Take a flock of sheep, made up of both black and white sheep, to the Areopagus, and let them go wherever they will and when they tire and lie down - right on that spot, you kill them and offer them as a sacrifice to the nearest idol.

²⁴ The God who made the world and everything in it is the Lord of heaven and earth and does not live in temples built by human hands. Acts 17:24

²⁵And he is not served by human hands, as if he needed anything. Rather, he himself gives everyone life and breath and everything else. Acts 17:25

²⁶From one man he made all the nations, that they should inhabit the whole earth; and he marked out their appointed times in history and the boundaries of their lands. Acts 17:26

God is Near

²⁷God did this so that they would seek him and perhaps reach out for him and find him, though he is not far from any one of us. ²⁸ 'For in him we live and move and have our being.' As some of your own poets have said, 'We are his offspring.' ²⁹ Therefore since we are God's offspring, we should not think that the divine being is like gold or silver or stone—an image made by human design and skill. Acts 17:26-29




In 1972 Flannery was posthumously awarded the "National Book Award For Fiction"



In her award winning book she wrote a short story called, "A Good Man is Hard to Find"




The story is about an escaped convict called "The Misfit"


The Misfit knew how outrageous the resurrection was. He says,




You Cannot Control the Response

³²When they heard about the resurrection of the dead, some of them sneered, but others said, "We want to hear you again on this subject." ³³ At that, Paul left the Council. ³⁴ Some of the people became followers of Paul and believed. Among them was Dionysius, a member of the Areopagus, also a woman named Damaris, and a number of others After this, Paul left Athens and went to Corinth. Acts 17:32-18:1
