


The word Messiah comes from the Hebrew word "Mashiac"

"Chosen One"




# The Greek equivalent is the word

"Christos"


or in english

is the same as "Jesus the Messiah"










#### Tolkien said to Lewis:

Here's my theory why you're so moved even though you're "we are here by accident guy." These fictional stories, say that this world is under an evil spell. Secondly, these stories point to the fact that the material world, this physical world, is not all there is.

### Tolkien said to Lewis:

There's a supernatural, not just a natural. There's a spiritual realm, not just a material realm. Thirdly, we need sacrificial love to save us. We're not going to be able to do it ourselves.

## Lewis says:

Very interesting theory. But all the old stories, are lies." As wonderful as they are, in the end they're lies.

#### Tolkien said:

No, they're not all lies. How about this one? The world is under an evil spell, but God sends his Son into the world, and he's born in the most unlikely place. He's not at all the kind of person you would think would do something, but he takes on the Romans, the Pharisees, and the demons.

#### Tolkien said:

But in the end, he's taken to die shamefully on the cross, and it looks like evil has defeated him, and yet he is raised from the dead. He brings together a band of people, and renews their lives, and then leaves them to change the world, but one day he will return and renew the whole world.

## Lewis says:

I've never heard the Christian story told like that. You're right. It is just like all these other stories that points to these underlying realities.


### Tolkien said:


No! Jesus Christ is the underlying reality to which all the stories point." Because this story is not just a story. This story became historical. This story became a fact. Jesus Christ was born.





